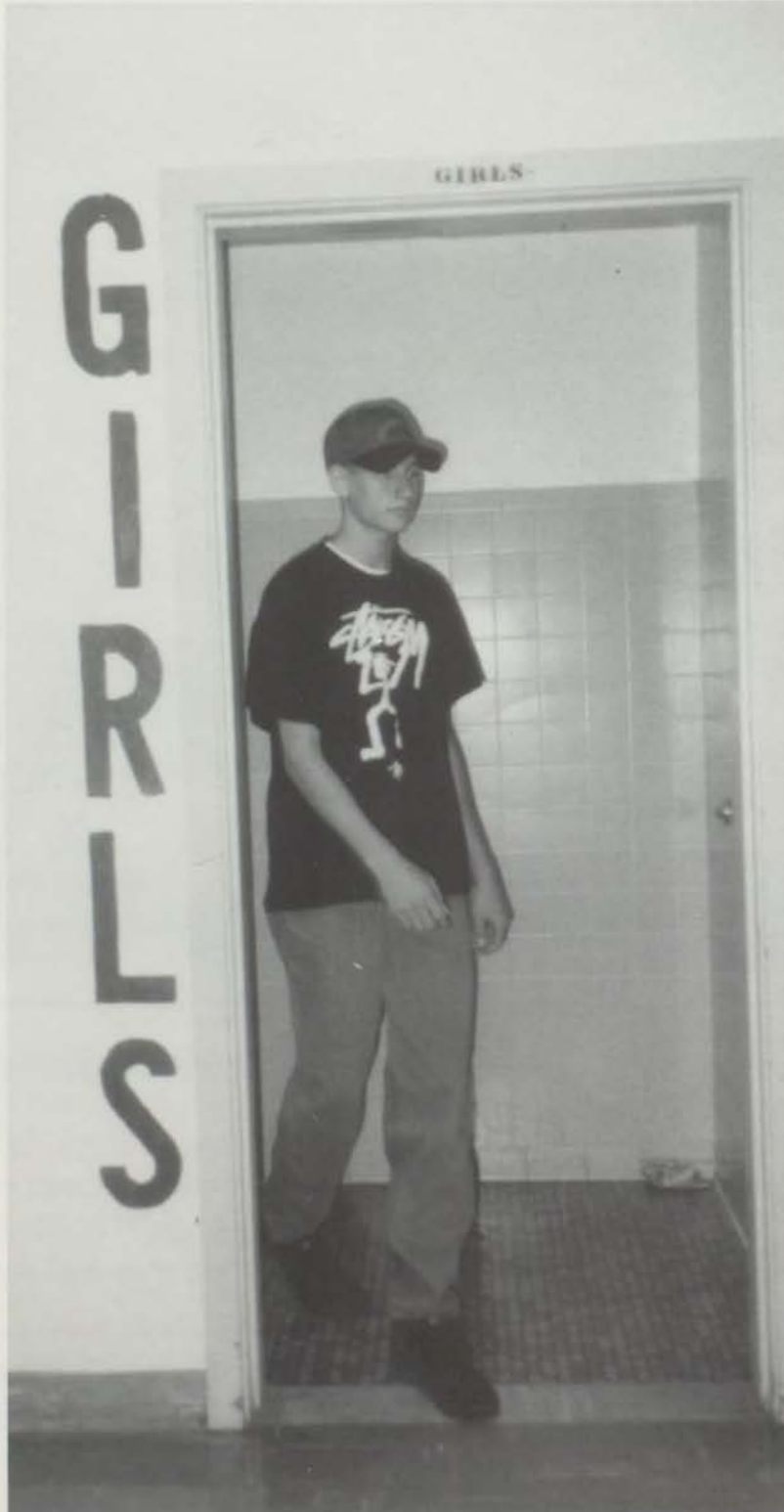
There will never be another "1994 Lebanon Warriors."

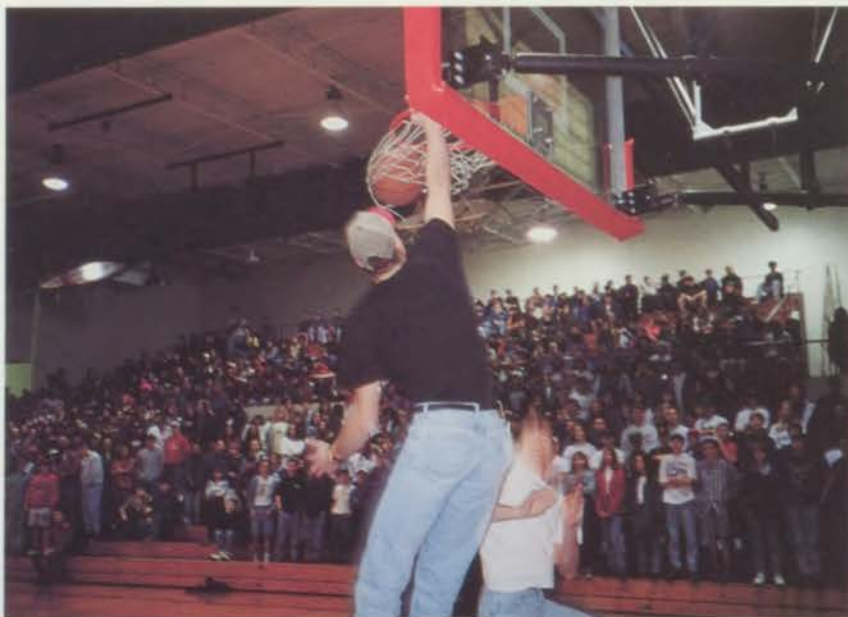

The queen, Megan Miller, sits among her court with a happy smile on her face. The princesses were escorted for the evening by their fathers. The decorations were provided by the senior class.

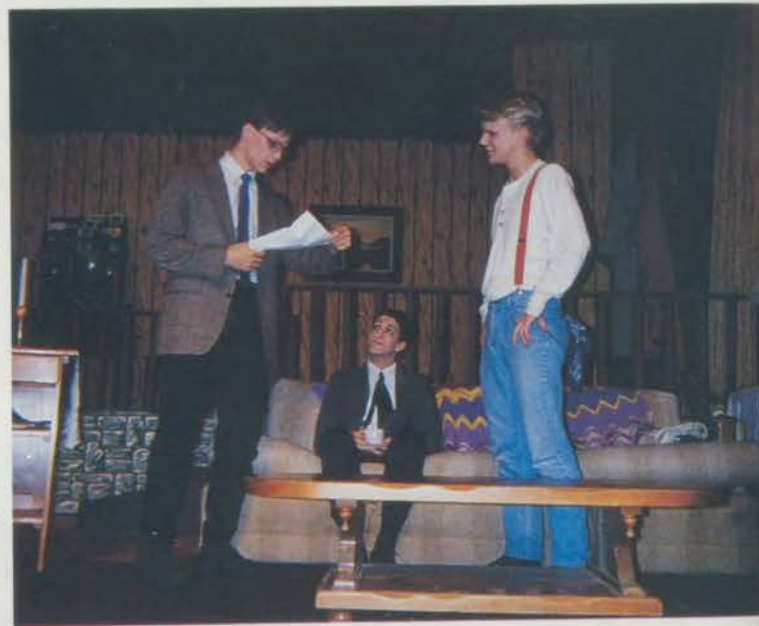

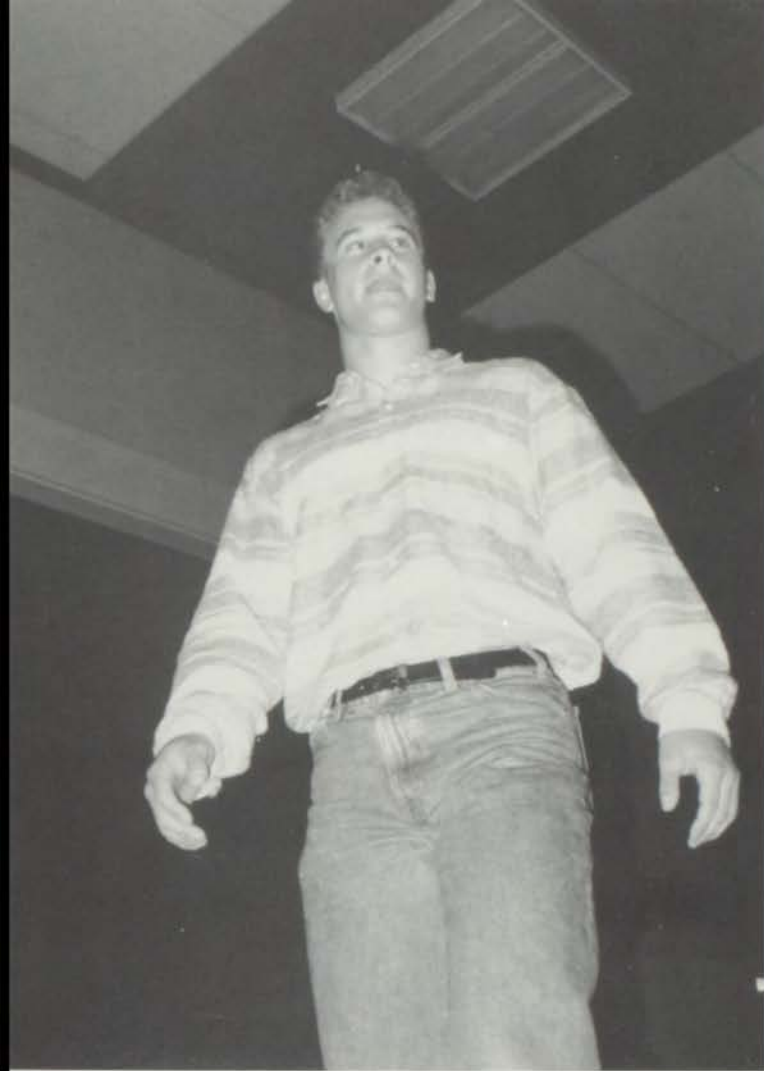

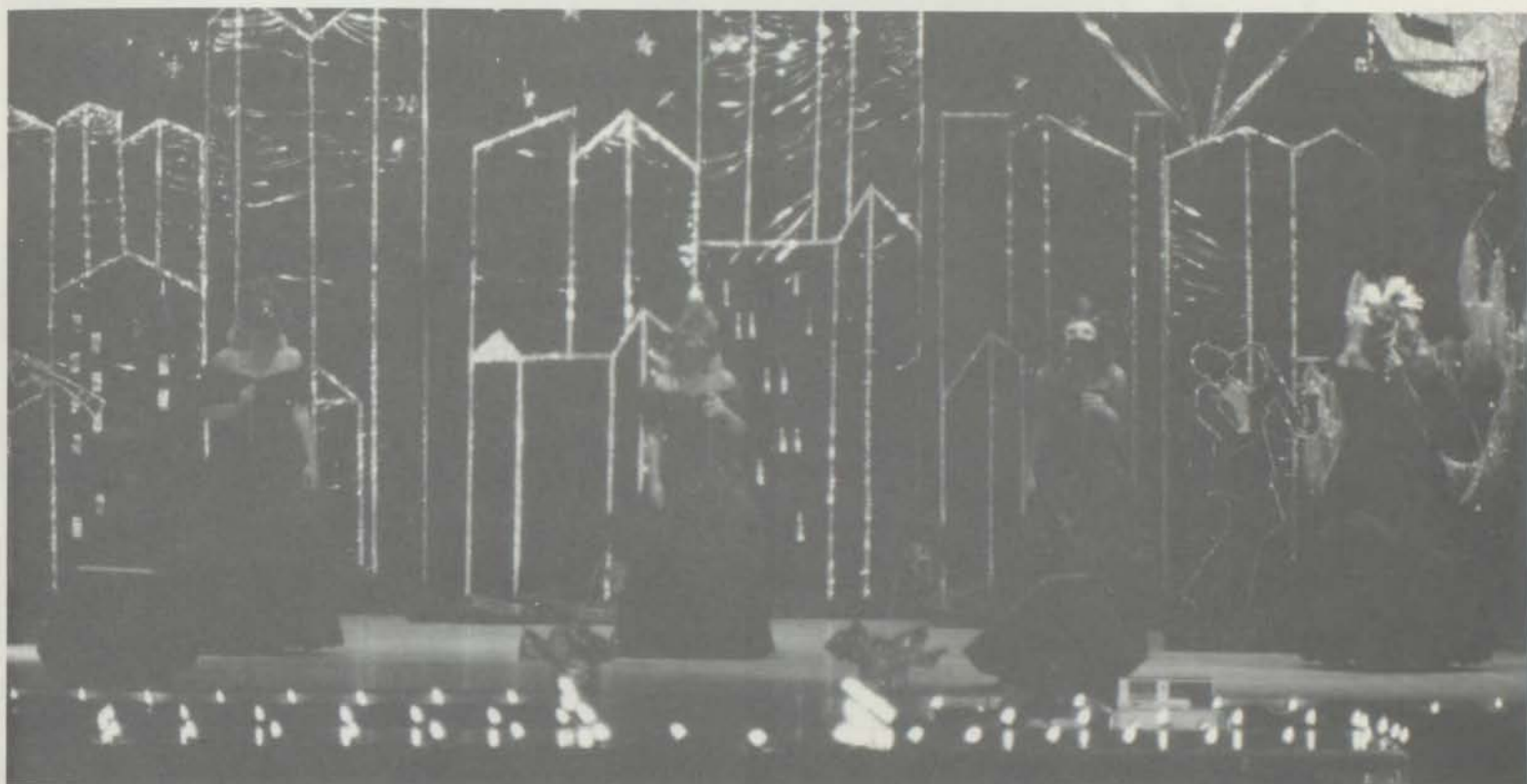

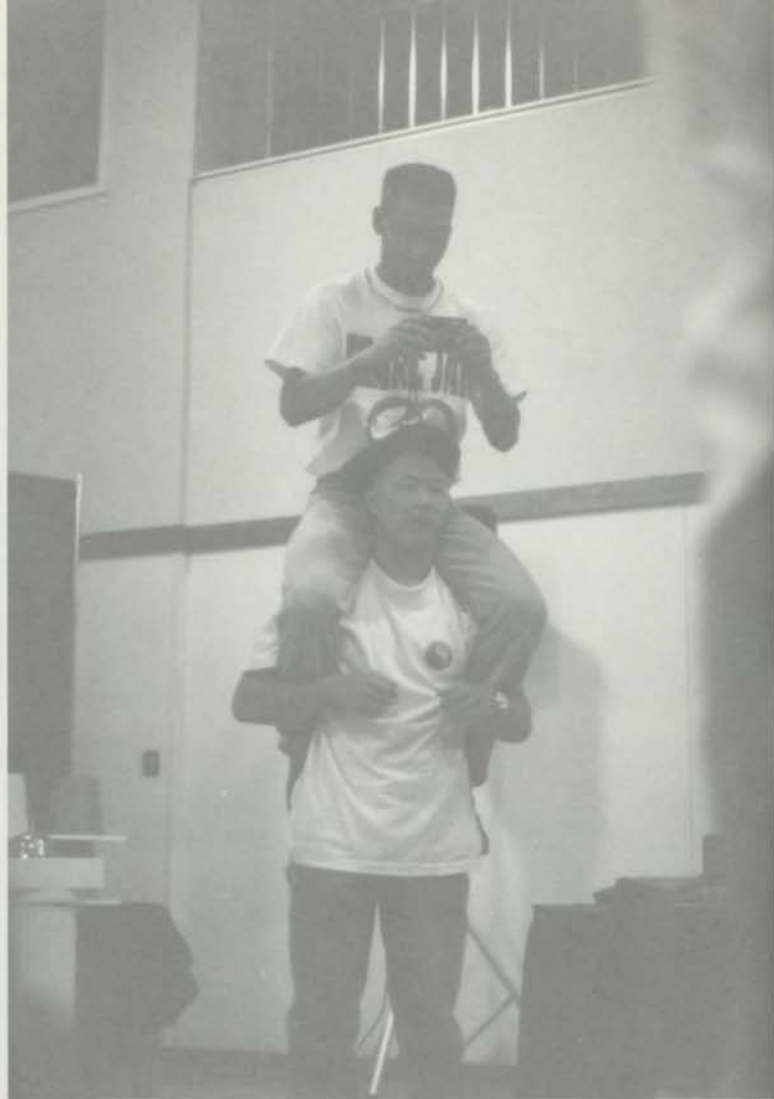

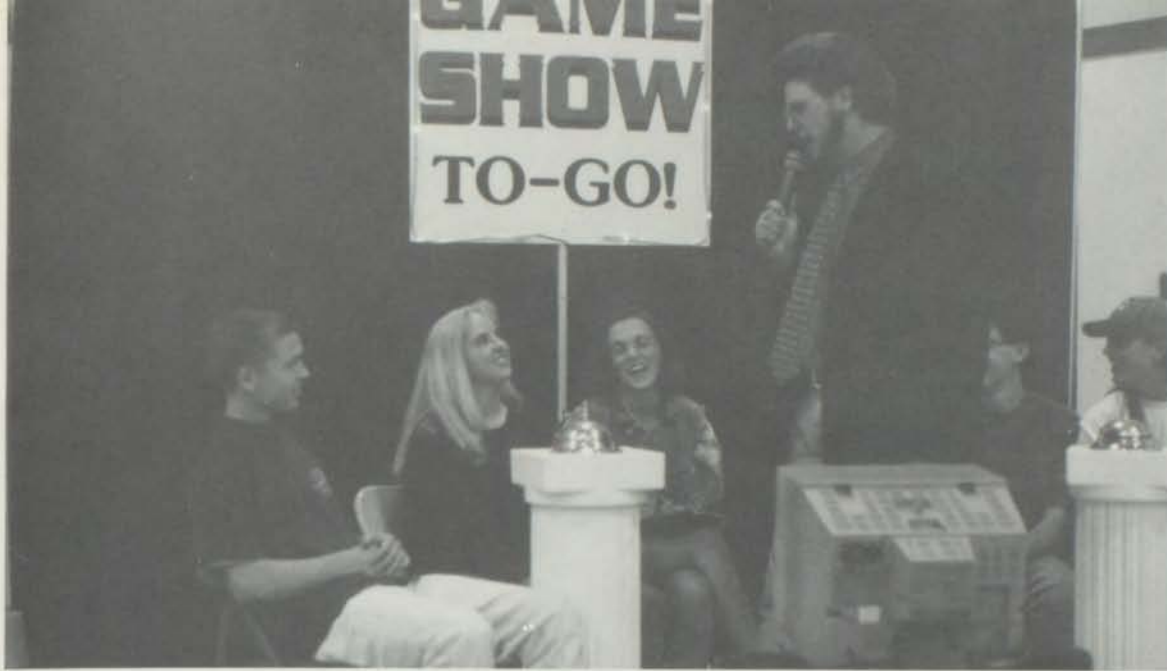

There was always a spirit of team work around the Warriors. All sports were encouraged to stick together through it all. The huddle holds hands to show their team effort in success.



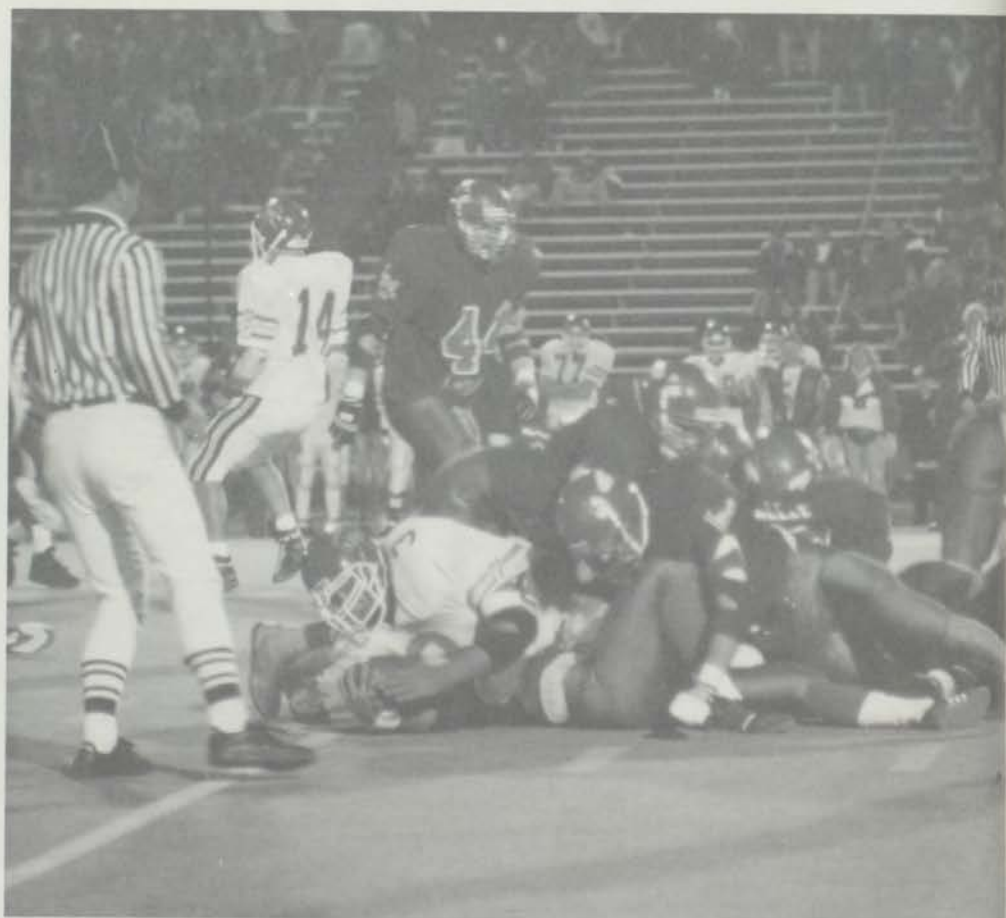

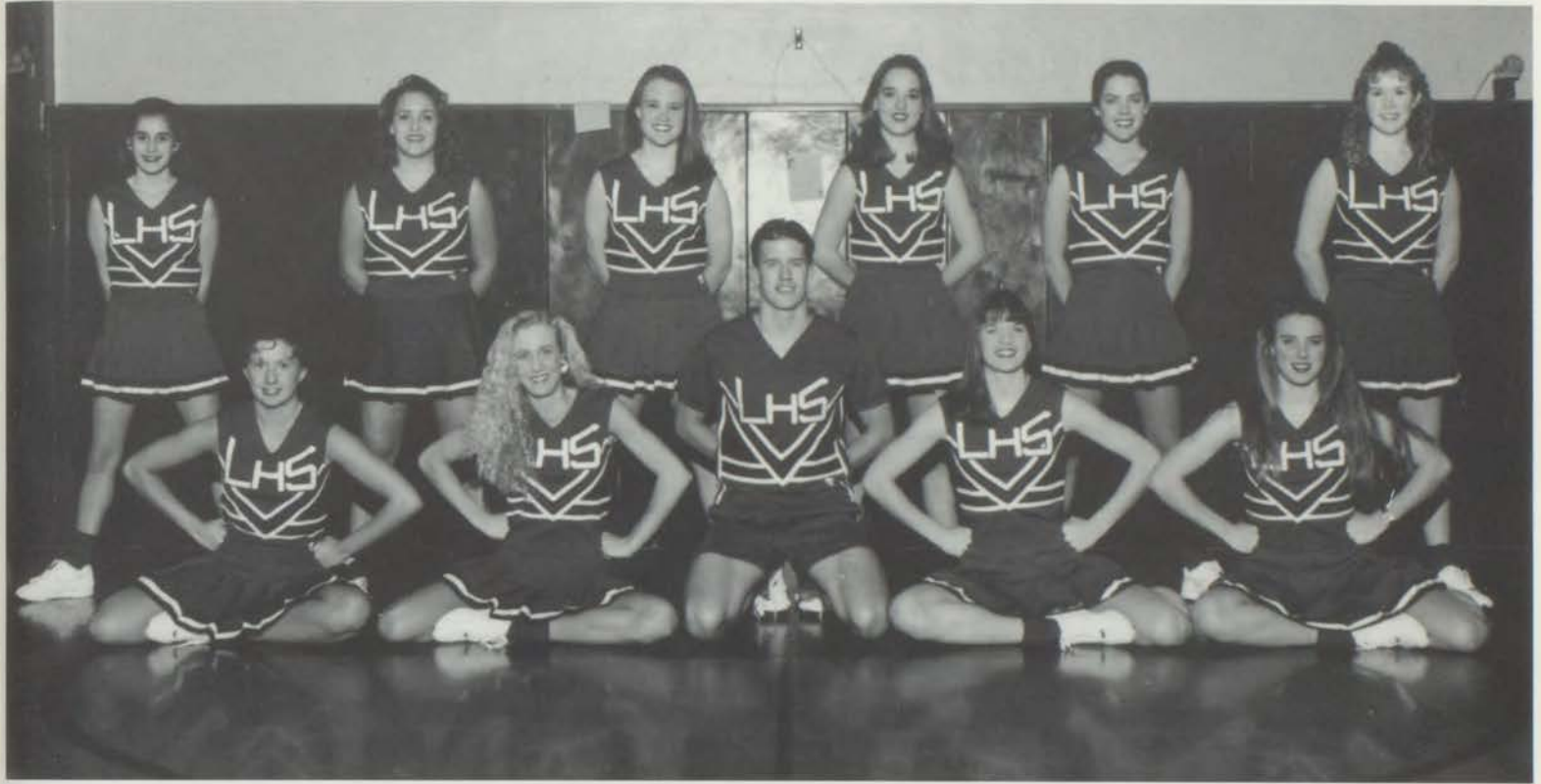

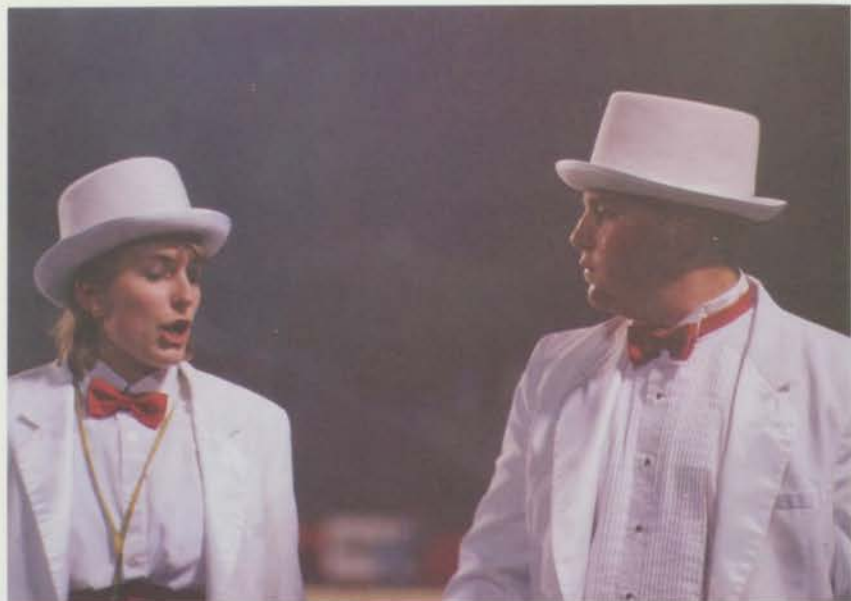

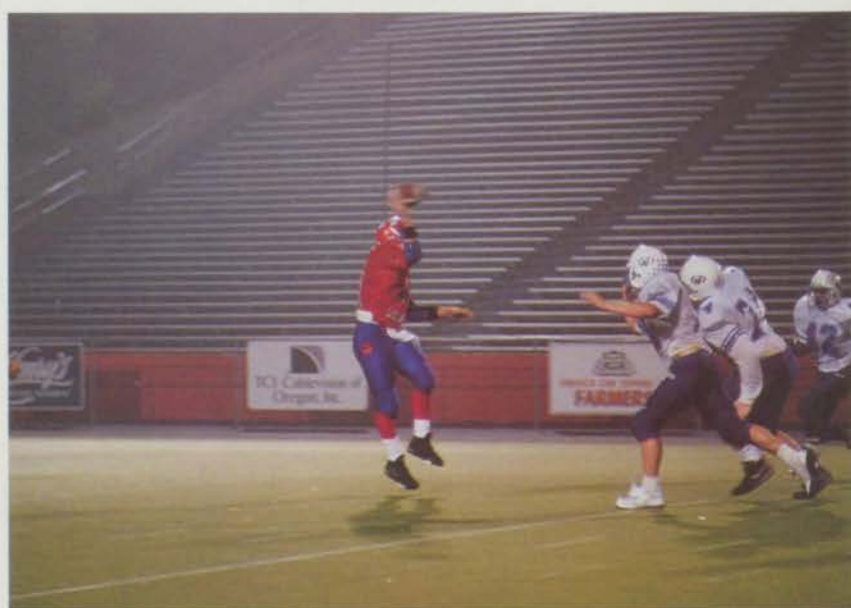

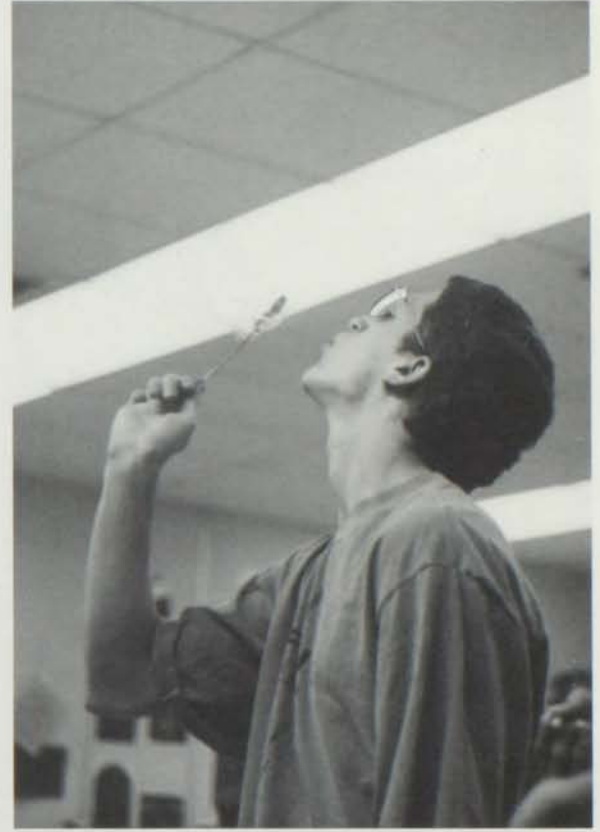

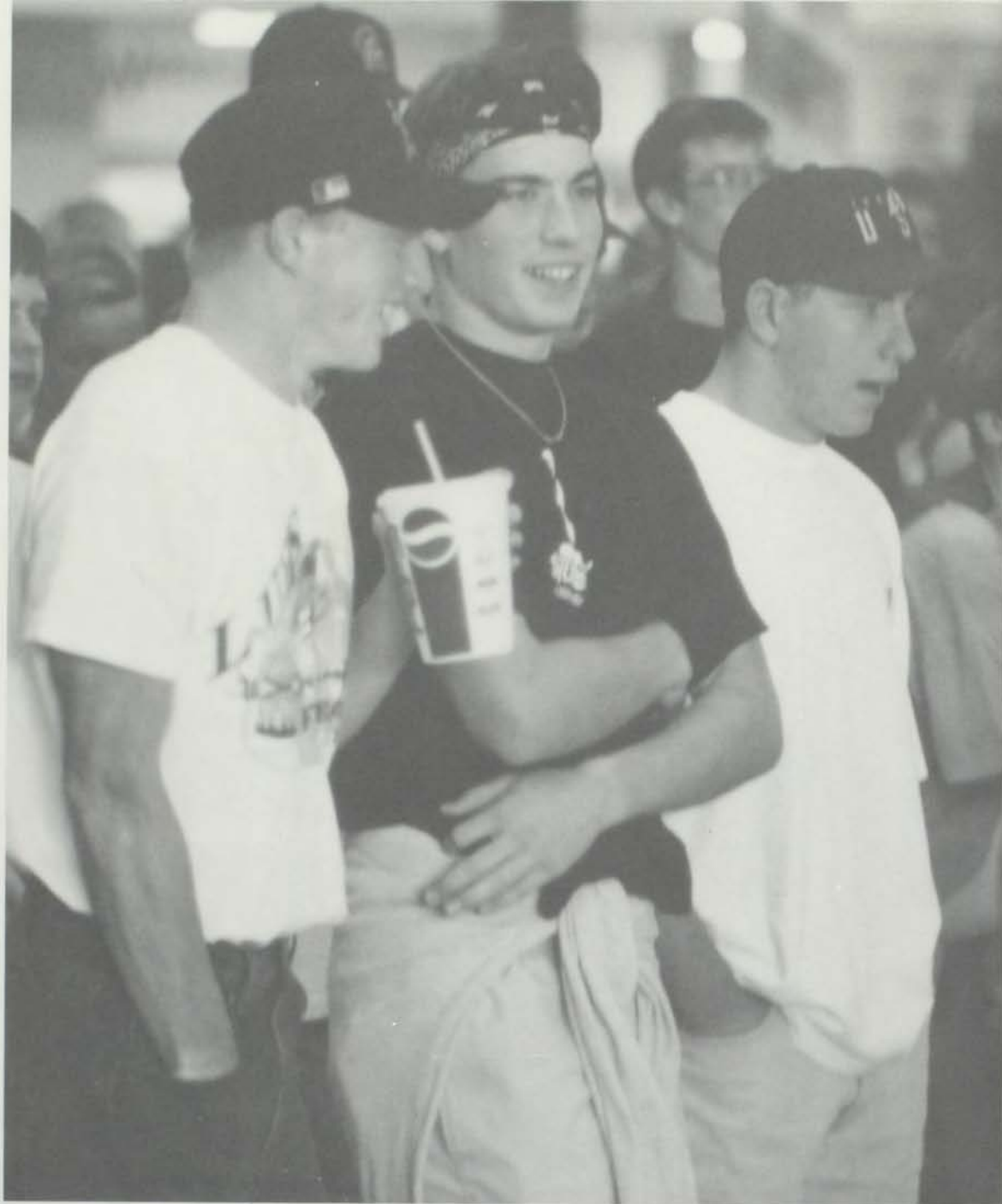

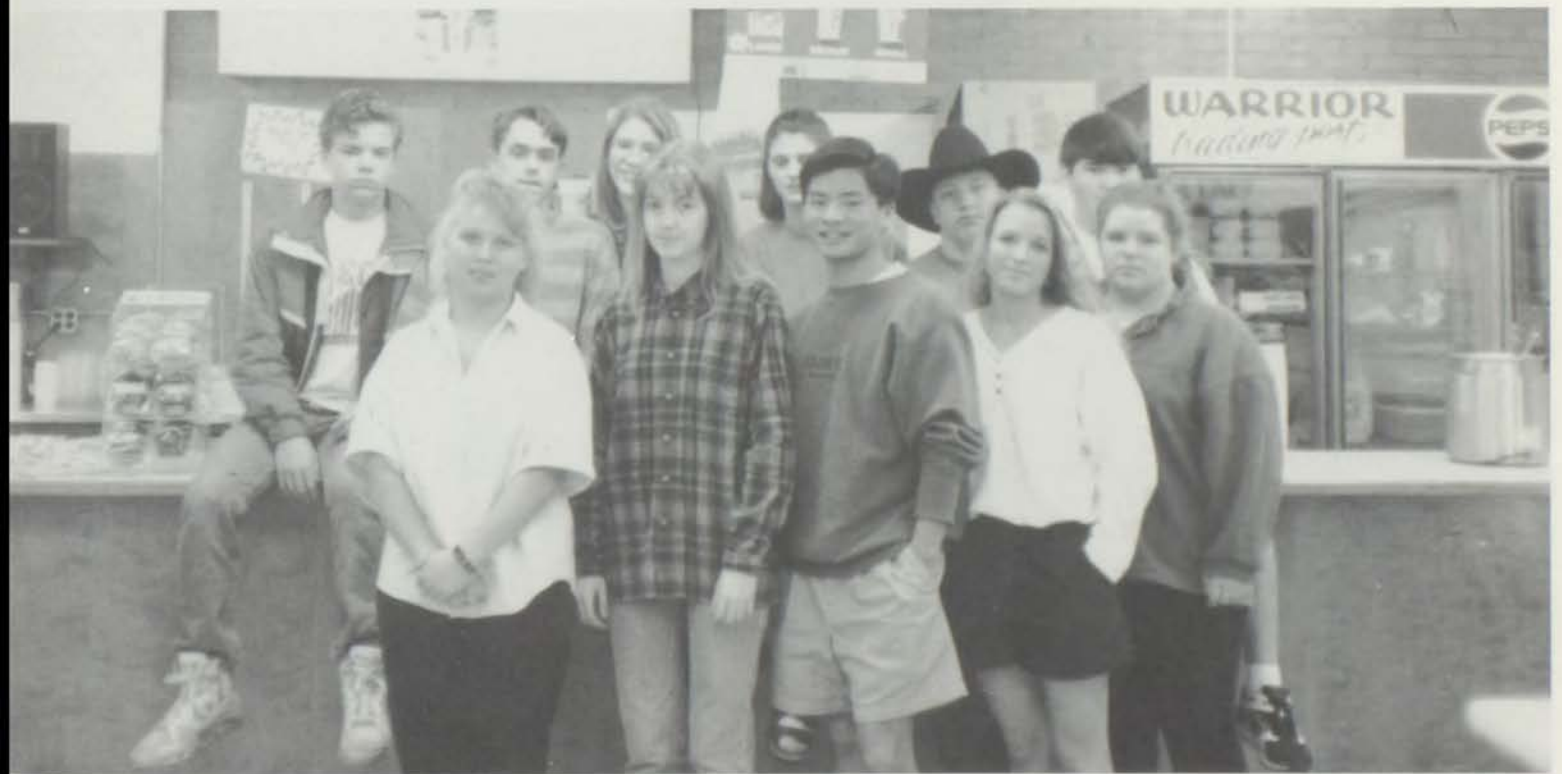

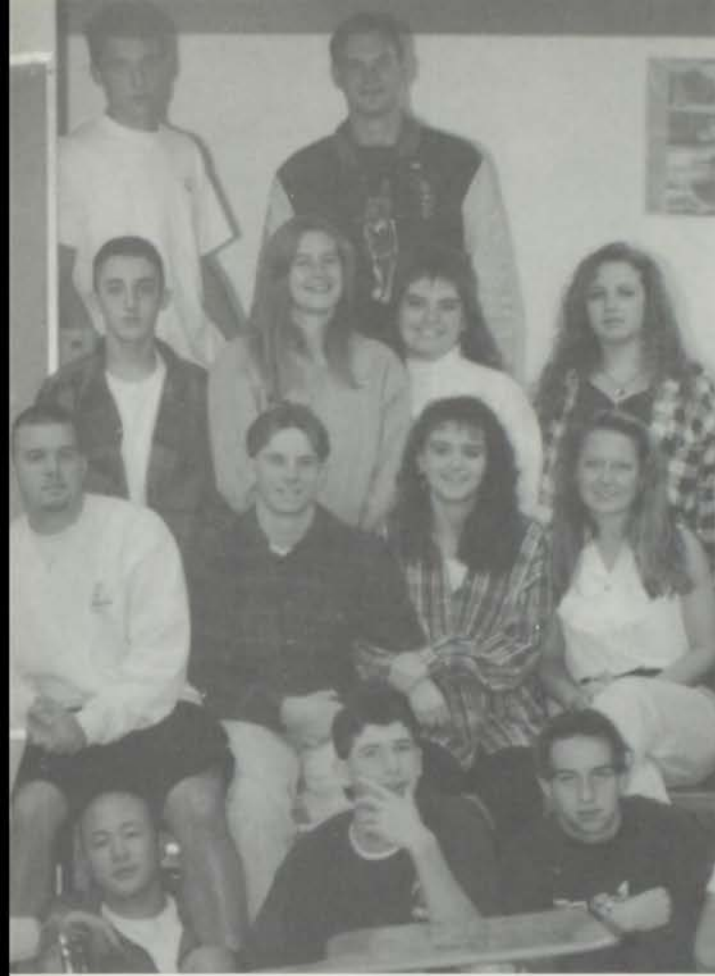
